


About the Book

The results of the examination of Foreign Office records researched by Angela Alabaster and of family correspondence, including newly found items are brought together to fill in some of the gaps in Henry Alabaster's life, particularly the situation that led to his transfer in mid-career from employment at the British Consulate in Bangkok to direct service for the King of Siam. This centres round his personal relationships with the Consul, George Knox and the Royal household, especially the King and the Prime Minister.

Also highlighted is Henry's special friendship with his young cousin, Percy Criddle which developed into a collaborative import business of goods into Bangkok.
